Words of Encouragement

As we come up to the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War, there are so many stories of sacrifice and bravery, but one stands out above all others, that of Capt. Noel Chavasse, a young man who loved his Lord and fellow man.

He was the only man in WWI to be awarded two Victoria Crosses for Bravery. He won these awards without killing anyone or picking up a weapon. The son of the Bishop of Liverpool, he spent the three years on the Western Front serving others as an army doctor, risking his life night after night in no-man's-land, bringing in wounded soldiers. He could have had a cushy job back in a Liverpool hospital, but chose to stay with his men.

In August 1917 in The Third Battle of Ypres, he was wounded by a shell splinter but stayed with the men and spent the night searching for the wounded and dying. He was mortally wounded by another shell landing in his Aid Post, and died the next day. He was buried in a small cemetery along with many of his men. On his grave stone are engraved two Victoria Crosses and the words "Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends".
